Introduction

County Demographic Profile

Duval County is located in northeast Florida, and is bordered by St. Johns, Clay, Bradford, Baker, and Nassau County. The county totals 918 square miles. According to the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS) 2021 5-year estimates, Duval County's 18 years of age and older population was approximately 797,130 individuals. The approximate racial/ethnic breakdown for the total Duval County population of 983,153 individuals according is as follows: 51% white non-Hispanic, 29% black non-Hispanic, 11% Hispanic/Latino origin, and 5% Asian non-Hispanic.

Project Background

In 2016, The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) contracted the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida (UNF) to conduct a multi-year study measuring community attitudes and opinions toward public safety and law enforcement in Jacksonville, Florida. To best accomplish this, PORL administers a bi-annual Community Survey of Jacksonville residents. The study has been conducted in 2016, 2018, 2021, and 2022. Project years were adjusted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Executive Summary

The 2022 JSO Community Survey yielded 1,697 responses. Key findings are highlighted in the executive summary below.

Methodology

Study Design

The 2022 study used a mixed-mode design, incorporating online surveys and phone interviews. The population of study is adult residents of Duval County (not including the Beaches Communities), aged 18 or older.

The online portion of the study used an address-based mode of contact, with postcards mailed out to respondents in advance. Each postcard had a general link to the online survey, administered via Qualtrics, as well as a unique access code to ensure each respondent only took the survey once. Postcards received 403 online responses. To increase response rates, the online sample was supplemented with PORL's proprietary online panel via email invitation, resulting in 142 additional responses. Online data collection took place between November 21 and December 27, 2022, garnering a total of 545 responses.

Respondents who were mailed a postcard but did not take the survey were contacted via telephone to attempt a phone interview. Due to low response rates in certain patrol zones, the telephone sample was supplemented with listed phone numbers targeted to the appropriate geographical areas.

Telephone data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 27-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system between December 5 and December 27, 2022. A maximum of 5 callbacks were

attempted for noncompletes with a working residential or cell phone line. Surveys were conducted in English. Calls were made from 4:00 to 9:00 p.m. (Mon-Fri.) and 12-5pm (Sat. and Sun.)

The total number of completed telephone surveys collected was 1,152. The breakdown of completed responses on a landline phone to a cell phone was 3% to 96%, with 1% unknown.

Marketing Systems Group (MSG) provided all the listed addresses and telephone numbers used in the sampling frame. For individuals answering on a landline telephone, the interviewer asked the first qualified respondent to



participate. Cell phone sample respondents were selected by being the first qualified participant to answer the phone.

To ensure a representative sample was being collected, the county was stratified using the 6 JSO patrol zones, which are broken down into sectors and sub-sectors so that officers can easily navigate and find neighborhoods within the community (see Table 1).

To decrease the margin of error in cross-analysis, and to ensure a proportionate number of completed surveys from across zones, quotas were set for completed surveys per patrol zone. The margin of sampling error for the total sample is +/- 2.4 percentage points. It is important to note that, due to smaller sample sizes, the observations made between zones have a greater margin of error, indicating a greater degree of uncertainty toward the true population than that of the entire sample (see Table 2).

In order to adjust for oversampling and to correct for non-response bias, a two-step weighting process was applied to the data. First, values in patrol zones that were oversampled were adjusted downward so as not to skew the countywide results. Second, in order to ensure that the results presented were reflective of the adult population of non-Beaches portion of Duval County, the total sample was weighted by age, sex, race, and education to the 2021 American Community Survey 5-year estimates for the adult population of the Duval County living in the 6 JSO patrol zones. For these survey questions, responses of 'Don't Know' or 'Refusal' were given a weight of 1. There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects.

American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation was used which consists of an estimate of what proportion of cases of unknown eligibility are truly eligible. This phone portion of this study had a 6% response rate.

About PORL

As members of AAPOR, the PORL's goal is to support sound and ethical practices in the conduct of survey and public opinion research. Moreover, the PORL is a charter member of the AAPOR Transparency Initiative and a member of the Association of Academic Survey Research Organizations.



Summary of Findings

This report was prepared for JSO following the administration of the JSO Community Survey. The conclusions and opinions expressed in this report do not necessarily represent those of JSO. This report serves to gauge community perceptions of public safety in Jacksonville, Florida (not including the Beaches Communities). In order to best accomplish this, the

Public Opinion Research Laboratory (PORL) at the University of North Florida (UNF) conducted a survey, the results of which are on the following pages. Figure 2 below outlines the demographic characteristics of the respondents in this survey. Demographic profiles of each patrol zone can be found in Appendix I of this report.

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job?




Figure 4. JSO Approval by Zone

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job?




Figure 5. JSO Approval by Race





Figure 6. JSO Approval by Call

Do you approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job?




Survey respondents were asked whether they approve or disapprove of the way the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office is handling its job. Figure 3 above displays the percentage of respondents who indicated they approve or disapprove, either somewhat or strongly, across all project years. As shown in the line graph, JSO approval saw a relatively sharp decrease between 2021 and 2022, falling from 70% to 54%. This sentiment was mirrored in disapproval, which rose from 24% in 2021 to 33% in 2022.

Broken down by patrol zone, Figure 4 shows that approval was highest in Zones 4 and 1, each with 58% of respondents saying they approve of the job JSO is doing. JSO approval was lowest in Zone 5, with 50%

approving either somewhat or strongly. When broken down by respondent race, shown in Figure 5, White respondents had the highest rate of JSO job approval at 59%, compared to just 47% among Black respondents. Approval among Hispanic and Latino respondents was 52%, and 55% among those of another race or ethnicity. JSO approval was also broken down by whether or not the respondent reported calling the police in the past year, displayed in Figure 6. While there are few notable differences between the two groups, those who indicated calling the police were slightly less likely to approve and slightly more likely to disapprove of JSO than those who did not call the police.

Figure 7. Neighborhood, Area, & Jacksonville Safety, 2016 - 2022

Respondents were asked the extent to which they agree or disagree that they feel safe their own neighborhoods, the areas they visit most frequently, and whether they feel Jacksonville, overall, is a safe place to live. Figure 7 shows the overall responses for each area, broken down by project year.

In all three categories, the percentage of respondents who reported feeling safe has remained largely steady since 2018, with a very slight uptick in 2022.

Across project years, respondents seem to feel safest in their own neighborhoods, with 87% saying they agree strongly or somewhat, up slightly from 84% in 2021. Respondents feel similarly safe in the areas they frequent, at 81%.

Despite the feelings of safety within their own neighborhoods and the areas they visit, notably fewer respondents feel that Jacksonville, overall, is a safe place to live, with just 64% saying they agree somewhat or strongly.

Agree or disagree: You feel safe in your neighborhood. % said "Strongly/Somewhat Agree"





Figure 8 is a map of Jacksonville showing the percentage of respondents who indicated they agree strongly or somewhat that they feel safe in their own neighborhoods, broken down geographically by patrol zone. The zone with the greatest percentage of

respondents who reported feeling safe in their neighborhood was Zone 3, with 92% saying they agree strongly or somewhat. Zone 1 had the lowest percentage of respondents who reported feeling safe in their neighborhood, although still the vast majority, at 74%

Respondents were also asked whether they found JSO personnel to be courteous and competent in their encounters with them. Figure 9 breaks down the responses geographically by patrol zone, displayed geographically on a map of Jacksonville. Zone 1 had the greatest percentage of people who agree strongly or

somewhat that JSO personnel are competent and courteous, at 75%. In 2022, the patrol zone with the lowest percentage of respondents who found JSO personnel to be courteous and competent was Zone 5, with 62%.

Agree or Disagree: In your encounters with JSO personnel, you find them to be courteous and competent.




Figure 11. Courteous by Race

Agree or Disagree: In your encounters with JSO personnel, you find them to be courteous and competent.





Figure 10 displays the overall responses to the courteous and competent question, broken down by project year. As shown in the chart, the percentage of respondents who agree strongly or somewhat has declined steadily since 2016, from 79% to 68% in 2022. The percentage of respondents who agree that JSO is courteous and competent only decreased by three percentage points in the past year, down from 71% in 2021.

Figure 11 breaks down responses by race, showing that White respondents are notably more likely to strongly agree with this statement with 40%, than their Black or Hispanic counterparts, with 29% and 32%, respectively. Respondents who reported their race as "other" had the greatest percentage that strongly agree. Across the four race and ethnicity categories, relatively few strongly disagreed that JSO is competent and courteous, with Black respondents having the greatest percentage at 10%.

Those respondents who strongly or somewhat disagreed that JSO is competent and courteous were then asked why they found their behaviors incompetent or discourteous. This was asked as an open-ended question and responses were later recoded into the categories shown in Figure 9, broken down by patrol zone. Among the total sample, the top two complaints, each with 28%, were that JSO personnel were rude, arrogant, or dismissive, as well as unresponsive,

ineffective, or incompetent. Rude/arrogant/dismissive was greatest in Zone 6, which had the greatest percentage of respondents who found JSO to be discourteous, as well as Zone 2, each with 37%. Unresponsive/ineffective/incompetent was greatest in Zone 4, also with 37%. While racial profiling and harassment was relatively low on the list for the total sample with 9%, 32% of respondents in Zone 1 made this complaint.

Why have you found their behaviors to be discourteous or incompetent?





Figure 13 breaks this open-ended question down by race and ethnicity. Rude/arrogant/dismissive was the most frequent complaint among Black respondents, with 32%, while White respondents indicated unresponsive/ineffective/incompetent as the top complaint with 37%. Among Hispanic and Latino respondents, the most common response was assuming

guilt and victim-blaming, with 33%. Unsurprisingly, racism and racial profiling was reported at much higher rates among Black (17%) and Hispanic (13%) than White respondents (2%). Responses in the "other" category include general bad experiences or dislike of JSO personnel.

Respondents were asked whether they agree or disagree that JSO does a good job in four different areas: handling complex investigations, investigating officer-involved shootings, following up on allegations of police misconduct with competent administrative and/or criminal investigations, and reporting back to the community about its findings on investigations of possible police misconduct. Figure 14 displays the percentage of respondents who agreed with each statement either somewhat or strongly, broken down by project year. In all four questions, the percentage of respondents who agree with the statement has declined

somewhat steadily since 2016, with a slight uptick in 2021. Across project years, agreement was greatest when asked about handling complex investigations. The percentage who agreed with this statement declined from 63% in 2021 to 54% in 2022. Forty-seven percent agreed JSO does a good job investigating officer-involved shootings, down from 56% in 2021. Regarding following up on allegations of police misconduct, 44% of the 2022 sample agreed JSO does a good job, and 43% agreed JSO does a good job reporting back to the community about its findings.

Agree or Disagree: JSO does a good job...





Figure 15 shows the percentage of respondents who agree with each of these statements, broken down by patrol zone. When asked whether JSO does a good job handling complex investigations, a majority of respondents agreed with this statement across all zones except Zone 5, with 48%. Regarding handling officer-involved shootings, the highest rate of agreement was

among Zone 4 respondents at 51%. Agreement that JSO does a good job following up on allegations of misconduct was highest among Zone 3 respondents with 47%. Zones 4 and 6 were tied for first in agreement that JSO does a good job reporting back to the community about its findings on investigations of possible police misconduct, each with 46%.

Figure 16. Police Brutality by Race, 2018 - 2022

Agree or Disagree: Being the victim of police brutality is something that you personally worry about.



Respondents were asked whether they, personally, worry about being the victim of police brutality, displayed in Figure 16, broken down by race and project year. This question was added to the survey instrument in 2018, and thus there are no responses for the 2016 project year. As seen in the chart, there has been almost no change in the overall response between 2018 and 2022, with a very slight uptick in 2022 from 35% to 37%. The percentage who said they personally worry about being

the victim of police brutality has remained the highest among Black respondents, essentially unchanged since 2018 with 64%. The percentage of White respondents who worry about police brutality remains steady at 18%, the lowest among racial groups. Among Hispanic and Latino respondents, however, the percentage who worry about police brutality has increased steadily, up from 41% in 2018 to 52% in 2022.

% said "Strongly/Somewhat Agree"





Figure 17, above, shows the percentage of respondents who are personally worried about policy brutality, broken down geographically by patrol zone. The zone with the

greatest percentage is Zone 5, with 55% who agree either strongly or somewhat. Personal worry about police brutality was lowest among Zone 3 respondents, at 29%.

Respondents were also asked a series of questions about JSO funding and resource allocation. Figure 18 shows the percentage of respondents who agree strongly or somewhat with each statement, broken down by project year. When asked if they agree that JSO needs more funding, 58% of respondents indicated agreement in 2022, a figure that has declined steadily

since 2016. After a steady increase between 2016 and 2021, the percentage of respondents who indicated JSO has enough officers to meet the city's needs dropped slightly in 2022 to 38%. The percentage of respondents who believe JSO is responsible with taxpayer money also saw a decrease this year, dropping from 53% in 2018 and 2021 to 44% in 2022.

Figure 19. Resources by Zone




Figure 19 displays the responses to resource allocation questions, broken down by patrol zone. When asked whether JSO needs more funding, a majority of respondents across all zones indicated they agree strongly or somewhat, the highest being Zone 6 with 63%, and the lowest Zone 1 with 51%. Conversely,

respondents in Zone 1 had the highest rate of agreement that JSO has enough officers to meet the city's needs with 45%, compared to just 28% in Zone 6. Zone 1 also had the greatest agreement when asked if JSO is responsible with taxpayer money and resource allocation with 50%, the lowest being Zone 5 at 38%.

Have You Called the Police in the Past Year? % said "yes"






Figure 20 shows the percentage of respondent who indicated they had called the police in the past year, broken down geographically by patrol zone. Zone 5 had the greatest number of respondents who indicated they

had called the police at 38%, up 10 percentage points from 2021. The zone with the fewest respondents who reported calling police was Zone 4, at 21%, down from its first-place position with 32% in 2021.

Figure 21. Emergency or Non-Emergency by Zone






Respondents who indicated they had called the police in the past year were then asked whether it was an emergency 9-1-1 call, or a non-emergency call. Of those respondents who called the police, 52% said they called the non-emergency number, while 35% said they called 9-1-1, with 13% saying they called both.

Zone 5 had the highest percentage of respondents who indicated calling 9-1-1 in an emergency with 50%, the lowest being Zone 6 with 24%. Among Zone 6 respondents who called the police in past year, 60% called the non-emergency number, compared to 35% in Zone 5.

All respondents were then asked whether they had any non-emergency contact with JSO in the past year. Figure 22 shows the responses broken down by patrol zone and project year. Overall, the percentage of respondents who reported having non-emergency contact with JSO has declined steadily since 2018, when the question was added to the survey instrument, dropping eight percentage points between 2018 and


2022. The greatest year-over-year decline can be seen in Zone 4, where non-emergency contact dropped from 44% to 33%.

Zone 5 was the only patrol zone that did not show a decrease in non-emergency contact, with a one-point increase from 37% in 2021 to 38% in 2022.

If JSO could do one thing for you in your neighborhood, what would it be?




In an open-ended question, respondents were then asked what one thing JSO could do in their neighborhood. Responses were recoded into the categories listed above in Figure 23, broken down by patrol zone. The category with the greatest percentage of responses across all zones was increasing visible presence and patrols, with 29% of the total sample. Zone 6 had the greatest percentage in this category,

while Zone 3 had the lowest. It should be noted that a major theme within this category was increasing foot and bike patrols. The second most frequent response overall was being more effective at reducing crime with 11% of the total sample, followed by increased traffic control with 9%, and increasing community policing and engagement with 8% of the total sample.

Figure 24. Issue Concern by Zone⁷






When asked what public safety issue concerns them the most, the top response across all six patrol zones was gun violence, with 42% of the total sample. As shown in Figure 24, Zone 6 had the greatest percentage of respondents who are most concerned with gun violence with 51%, and Zone 2 respondents were least

concerned with gun violence at 34%. Homelessness came in a distant second place with 20% of the total sample, the greatest percentage among Zone 4 respondents with 23% and the lowest in Zone 6 with 16%

Which public safety issue should get more resources allocated to it?




Respondents were also asked which public safety issue should have more resources allocated to it, and given the same answer choices as above, shown in Figure 25. Gun violence was, again, the top choice of the total sample, but these responses were a bit more varied across patrol zones.

In Zone 4, the top issue for resource allocation was mental health with 26%, followed by homelessness with 25%, and gun violence with 23%. Although not quite enough to warrant a separate category, worth noting is an emerging theme of gang violence in "Other."

Figure 26. Issue Concern & Resource: Top 3, 2021 - 2022




The top three choices for biggest public safety concerns were the same as the top three issues that should have the most resources allocated to them, both in 2022 and 2021 when these questions were added to the survey, shown here in Figure 26. The top issues of concern

remained consistent between project years, with gun violence increasing slightly from 39% to 42%. In the resources question, however, the order has changed somewhat since 2021, with gun violence taking the lead over mental health and homelessness.

Thinking about the news, which of the following options would you most prefer for getting your local news?



Respondents were asked how they prefer to get local news, represented in Figure 27, broken down by patrol zone. Watching local news on television was the most popular response across all six zones, with 38% of the total sample. It was highest among Zone 5 respondents

at 56%, and lowest in Zone 4 at 34%. Websites or apps and social media came in second and third, with 27% and 18%, respectively. Word of mouth, JSO's website, JSO's social media, and print newspapers each had just 3% of the total sample.

Figure 28. Social Media by Zone







Figure 29. Social Media by Age


When it comes to social media, do you, or would you follow JSO on these platforms?



Survey respondents were also asked to select all of the social media platform(s) on which they follow or *would* follow JSO, displayed in Figures 28 and 29 above, broken down by patrol zone and age category. Facebook was the most frequent response in the total sample (41%), as well as across patrol zones, the highest being Zone 6 with 47%. Instagram was the next

most frequent with 20% of the total sample. There is more variation in social media choices between age groups, with only 20% of 18-to-24-year-olds, compared to 53% of 45-to-50-year-olds. LinkedIn was the least popular across zones and age groups, with 7% of the total sample.

Finally, respondents were asked whether they have visited the main JSO website, as well as the JSO's career website, and open data and transparency website. As shown in Figure 30, 34% of the total sample

indicated they had visited the JSO website, with 12% reporting having visited the career website and 8% for the transparency website.
